

PSCI 598-303 West European Politics

Department of Political Science, University of Pennsylvania

This seminar is devoted to analysis of the domestic politics and political economy of Western European countries during the post-World War II period. Topics include political parties and party systems; economic regulation, labor relations, and the welfare state; political participation and political culture; and the interaction of subnational, national and supranational politics. Unifying these topics is an analytic emphasis on the historical antecedents of contemporary politics, and on the ways in which political scientists seek to understand continuities and discontinuities in European politics.

The course combines a broad overview of developments across the region with assignments that encourage each student to develop a specialization in the politics of one West European country. This seminar is a research seminar, but it is also a field seminar in West European politics, requiring the development of a more generalized knowledge of West European politics than could be attained solely from work on a single highly focused research project. In order to strike a productive balance between contextual and country-specific knowledge, the course combines required readings, research and examination.

Undergraduate students may choose either of the two grading options below. Graduate students must take Option 2.

Option 1:

(15%) Four briefing papers
(35%) Attendance and informed participation in seminar
(50%) Final paper OR Final exam

Option 2:

(15%) Four briefing papers
(25%) Attendance and informed participation in seminar
(35%) Final paper
(25%) Final exam

Incompletes will not be granted for undergraduates except in the case of dire medical emergency. They will be granted, reluctantly, for graduate students who have a good reason to want to complete the final paper ONLY over the summer.

Reading:

Weekly readings are general and/or theoretical in nature. Those readings that do refer to a particular country case have been selected because of their more general implications. Students will be required to do some outside reading in order to gain country-specific knowledge. Students are expected to come to class having read and digested the readings, and prepared to discuss them analytically. Doing the readings in the order in which they appear on the syllabus will often make the analytical thread more clear.

Country-specific research:

Each participant will conduct outside research throughout the semester on a particular country or pair of countries, to be assigned during the first class meeting based on individuals' interests and the need for representation of all major countries. This outside research will enable each member of the class to serve as an expert on how the week's readings apply to his or her country. The results of this research will be collected in a series of four short (2-5 pages) briefing papers that outline the application of a week's topic to the country in question. For example, a briefing paper for Spain for Week 13 (Regions and Regionalisms) might include an overview of the development of Spain's federal structure, a brief history of Basque and Catalan regionalist movements, and an analysis, informed by the weekly readings, of why regional movements have taken the particular form that they have in these two areas. **Briefing papers must be distributed to the entire seminar via email by 9:30 AM on Monday. Briefing papers may be submitted for any four weeks of the course.**

Research paper and proposal:

Outside research will also be required for a final research paper. Papers will illuminate one or more of the major theoretical debates raised during the course by answering an empirical puzzle related to the experiences of one or more European countries in the post-

War period. Graduate students should expect to submit this paper for presentation at a political science conference or for publication. Each student will submit a **paper proposal on Monday October 10** stating (a) what the central empirical question motivating the paper is, (b) how investigation of this empirical question will contribute to a theoretical debate raised in the course readings, and (c) what research will be necessary to answer the question. The paper proposals will be returned with comments by Friday October 15 (before Fall Break). **The final paper, not to exceed 35 pages double-spaced, will be due on Friday December 9.**

Final exam:

There will be a take-home final examination similar in style to a graduate comprehensive exam. The exam will provide the motivation to integrate the issues raised in the weekly readings with a wider variety of country cases, preparing graduate students for further work in comparative politics and political economy. (It is worth noting, though, that in past years undergraduate students have performed as well as graduate students on this exam.) Exam questions will require students to combine general readings from the course with country-specific knowledge. **The take-home exam may be taken at any time during reading period or exam period (Dec 10-21).** Students may have the exam paper for a period of 24 hours, but will write the exam during a period of no more than four hours.
